Industry to Student Speed-Networking Event – Tuesday 13th April (8:30-11:00am)

We've already got 100+ students registered from multiple disciplines so get in quick to ensure your spot.

HOW WILL IT WORK?

- 1. You will be talking for 2 solid hours Unlike your usual careers expo, it's students who are grouped at tables by discipline and industry will be working the room for a continuous stream of 5-minute interactions.
- 2. Why a morning event? For 2 simple reasons, there's more energy and you can attend the event, then get on with the rest of your day rather than having to forgo your evening for an after-work function.
- 3. What disciplines will I engage with? You select up to 3 disciplines during the registration process, we do our best to connect you with as many students as possible from those groups.
- 4. How will I follow up with students? There will be a post-event survey where you indicate the students you're keen on, they will do the same, we then confirm any matches so you can continue a dialogue.
- 5. When are the students looking to do a placement? We're prioritising students seeking to undertake placements in our June, August or November cohorts this year.
- 6. **Can I bring colleagues?** Yes. We're currently inviting industry partners to bring multiple personnel, if we hit capacity we'll reassess at that point.

A different approach this month, promoting our 10-year partnership with CareerTrackers, a key component of UniSA's Reconciliation Action Plan.

In June 2018, UniSA committed to a 10-year Partnership Agreement with CareerTrackers, a national non-profit organisation that works with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander university students, and private sector companies, to create career pathways through a structured internship program.

CareerTrackers creates multi-year internship opportunities for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander university students that can lead to bright professional futures. CareerTrackers is the largest community in Australia of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students and professionals. Our Interns and Alumni represent a generation of Indigenous professionals who are changing the landscape of Australian workplaces. CareerTrackers has a 50-year vision to build generations of Indigenous professionals who are able to access leadership and enable change for their communities.
