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# Wine study shows locals love the cellar Back to story index door

A new study into cellar door operations at Australian wineries has shown that most visitors to wineries are Australian locals, with the typical visitor being a female visiting for the first time.

The national longitudinal research, funded through the Grape and Wine Research and Development Corporation (GWRDC) and taking in six Australian States and including 15 wine regions, is painting an interesting picture of the cellar door visitor.

"Not only are most of them local, they are also influenced to attend wineries by their own local knowledge and knowledge of the winery brand, and 46 per cent of those surveyed said word-of-mouth recommendation or informal sources influenced their winery visit," says UniSA Project Leader Professor Johan Bruwer.

In its first stage, the inter-institutional research project involving UniSA's wine marketing research specialists and colleagues at Charles Sturt University, is based on surveys of 3600 cellar door visitors, at 79 wineries across Australia.

Researchers found the typical cellar door visitor profile is female, a regular wine-drinker, highly educated, has a small household and high income and is far more likely to be from an Australian capital city than another country.

"Only six per cent of the total number of visitors to cellar doors are from overseas, but interestingly almost 60 per cent of all visitors are first-timers, so the cellar door offers real opportunities to impress consumers," says

Prof Bruwer.

"Around 67 per cent of visitors to the cellar doors bought wine to take away, and altogether, 75 per cent of visitors did not leave without buying at least something."

Researchers also found that many cellar door visitors are also wine club members of the winery visited and/or of other wineries, and overall had a good knowledge of wine brands and some loyalty to them.

"We're also suggesting there may be an association with buying or trying a particular brand of wine and then visiting the cellar door – so it seems there is a flow between wine brand recognition and the cellar door experience," says Prof Bruwer.

Those surveyed were mostly regular drinkers consuming mainly red (49 per cent), white (35 per cent), and sparkling wine (10 per cent).

### From the Vice Chancellor





You're probably very aware by now of the broad vision we have for the future of this university. Many of you were closely connected with **Unijam**, which was held 10 months ago, and in the compilation of the action sets we are taking to deliver on our promises.

We're about to launch our Global Engagement Framework and if you missed the presentation in the Bradley Forum here's an update and an invitation to come and discuss the plans in future forums.

Why global you might ask? Because it is essential for any university that wishes to remain at the cutting edge of the disciplines it teaches to be partnered with the science, technology, biotech, cultural and economic powerhouses of the world. We need to be able to access and deliver – and help create – the new knowledge that will differentiate UniSA from our competition and enhance our reputation as the go-to university for business and the professions.

Then there's the need for rankings. We're a young university and rankings are often the only measure that

academics and employers use in judgement. There are, after all, more than 10,000 universities worldwide; it takes a number on that list to help identify you. That's why we care so much about stats – such as being in the top three per cent of the world's universities and being ranked in the world's top 50 universities under 50 by THE and QS rankings. As our rankings continue to improve, more academics want to work with us and more employers want our graduates.

And being a globally visible university increases the number of international students who are attracted to our campuses. A healthy proportion of students from outside Australia helps to provide the kind of international environment that makes university such a vibrant place for students who can then learn from each other, broaden their horizons and build the personal and potential professional networks they need for their future global careers.

Not only are we focused on bringing more students here, in *Crossing the Horizon* we committed to increasing UniSA's offshore footprint across the Asia-Pacific through international campus collaborations.

Back in 2007 we started withdrawing from our transnational operations and, while there were good reasons for doing so then, there was a perception that our engagement in the Asia Pacific was a less than committed one. We learned some lessons – that's the business we're in after all – and we're back in the region stronger than ever.

We're offering a new set of programs through Hong Kong Baptist University and in Singapore we're creating a dedicated space on Orchard Road in the CBD that's branded UniSA. We'll be the only foreign university to have a dedicated city centre campus and, in true UniSA style, there will be a strong element of employer engagement. Internships and career opportunities are integrated into the programs and reinforced by a dedicated Director of Employment and Industry Engagement with a contact book you couldn't jump over. This campus will offer UniSA programs, initially from the Business School, EASS and ITEE, with Health Sciences to follow.

Global reach and leverage was our initial goal but global mobility sounds pretty good too, not just for offshore students to get the same UniSA experience as their onshore colleagues, but for local students and for our staff to travel and make their own global connections.

Nobody around here stands still for long.

### UniSA shines at construction competition in Texas

For the second year running, UniSA students have teamed up with students from Oklahoma University to win a design and build competition in the United States.

Three UniSA students and a Program Director/Senior Lecturer travelled to Texas in February to take part in the Associated Schools of Construction Regional Competition (region 5), a competition held across the United States to test construction industry skills of university students.

For the second year, UniSA joined forces with Oklahoma University to field an international team in the competition.

Construction Management and Economics students Luke Ferme and Jake Harry along with Architectural Studies student Aaron Davies and their Oklahoma teammates had 16 hours to deliver a design for a church complex.

Dr Terence Lam, Program Director and Senior Lecturer in the School of Natural and Built Environments said the timeline of 16 hours was particularly challenging for the team.

"All the team members took the competition very seriously and deserve the prizes they won," Dr Lam said.

"The students enjoyed the team work but most importantly, the international student exchange experience.

"Plans are already underway for next year's competition with the possibility of the Oklahoma team members spending some time at UniSA before the competition.

"This would certainly be a good idea in regards to the team being able to meet in person and prepare for the competition, as well as the exchange benefits for their students."

As well as taking out first place in the Design and Build Competition, Aaron Davies was awarded the best presenter prize.

"It is a great honour for UniSA to be awarded these prizes in what is a competitive program in the United States," Dr Lam said.

"We are very thankful to the School of Natural and Built Environments and the School of Art, Architecture and Design for supporting this event which provides an excellent learning experience for the students."

### New node paves way for nano-medicine

UniSA's expertise in nanomaterials design, cell biology and engineering are at the forefront of a new Node in a \$26 million ARC Centre of Excellence in Convergent Bio-Nano Science and Technology (CBN).

UniSA is one of four nodes of the Centre which is headquartered at Monash University.

UniSA Node Leader and Deputy Director of the Mawson Institute, Professor Nico Voelcker says the Centre will deliver breakthroughs in areas in which Australia has major strength, including diagnostics and imaging, smart biomaterials, vaccines and drug delivery.

"The research will see the biomedical advances such as the development of nano-sized drug delivery devices targeting tumours, immune cells," Prof Voelcker says.

"At the same time, we will see the emergence of sensors that can diagnose diseases well before conventional methods can, or provide in-situ feedback on disease treatment efficiency.

"Fostering technology innovation and the sustained growth of high value manufacturing are critical for the Australian and South Australian economies."

Fellow member of the node, Professor Thomas Nann says the breakthroughs delivered through the centre will be based on an advanced understanding of the fundamental science at the interface of engineered materials and biological systems.

UniSA's involvement in the Centre has been backed by \$300,000 in funding from the State Government's Collaboration Pathway Program.

### Local innovators take home international technology award

Against some high-powered competition, UniSA's Institute for Telecommunications Research (ITR) has won an international award for innovative communications technology.

ITR's Global Sensor Network (GSN) has been voted Technology of the Year 2013 by the Wireless Innovation Forum, a non-profit 'mutual benefit corporation' dedicated to technology innovation in commercial, civil, and defence

communications around the world.

The GSN won the award against some strong competition from NASA, which was nominated for a communication system, developed for the International Space Station.

GSN technical director, Dr David Haley says the GSN was developed for remote data collection and bidirectional communication via low earth orbit satellites.

ITR Acting Director, Jeff Kasparian and Senior Research Fellow and GSN Technical Director, Dr Haley both accepted the award at the Wireless Innovation Forum's annual WinnComm Conference in Illinois.

"The GSN program represents a significant outcome, with contributions from 28 academics and engineers within ITR. I'm immensely proud of what David and his team have achieved," Kasparian says.

GSN partners included COM DEV (Canada) and SAGE Automation, CSIRO, DSTO and the Australian Institute of Marine Science. The development of the Global Sensor Network was assisted by funding from the Federal Government's Australian Space Research Program.

### New study looks at downsizing options for seniors

Housing is one of the major challenges for our ageing population, according to the Australian Government's Advisory Panel for Positive Ageing. But a new joint University of Western Australia-UniSA study is set find out how to ease the transition from a large family home to a more suitable and often smaller home while maintaining senior citizens' independence.

Led by Professor Wendy Lacey, the study will investigate what obstacles senior citizens face when considering housing options. She says the study will assist in informing planning laws and policy, with the aim of reducing the barriers senior citizens encounter when downsizing.



"We want to find out why people do or more importantly don't choose to downsize," Prof Lacey says.

"We suspect a lack of appropriate housing options within an older person's existing area is the problem, along with impediments caused by existing planning laws which deter the development of suitable and innovative housing for people to downsize to.

"Often people want to downsize but they don't necessarily want to move into retirement villages."

Researchers are currently looking for people over 50 years of age to take part in the study. Participation involves an interview, with questions relating to the reasons why seniors choose to or not to downsize and what needs to be done from a legal, planning and/or policy perspective to enhance the options for downsizing.

"It is particularly useful for recently arrived overseas students and tourists, as it is packed full of information on what to see and do, eat and drink, and how to get around – all with in-app web and map display, including the distance from you to the place of interest, and in the 'What's On' section there are dynamic updates of current and future events. These include upcoming arts, theatre, concerts, festivals, sports and more."

He says one powerful feature of the app allows the user to share details of any of the events and attractions directly via Facebook, Twitter, email and text.

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### Unijam quick wins in action across campuses

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A number of projects that stemmed from UniSA's community planning online conversation, unijam, and were then included in the Crossing the Horizon plans released last year, are coming to fruition.

The new Campus Connector shuttle bus service between Magill and Mawson Lakes is now running as a trial for study period two. The free bus service for staff and students (ID card needed) departs from the two campuses every hour from 9.10am to 4.10pm, Monday to Friday.

A virtual suggestion box for staff and students is live on the staff and student portals. A number of suggestions have already been received and feedback on actions will be taken on the 'we're listening' website.

Full video lecture recording is now being piloted in two lecture theatres. After study period two, an evaluation will take place and determine the way forward for this project.

A 'Go Mobile' strategy has been developed and a mobile-friendly website has been launched.

A competition will run for students to suggest an app that they would find useful for their study with the best three being adopted. Students have already been consulted about a wider UniSA app which is currently being finalised.

Students were also heavily consulted about UniSA's new campus clothing line. The new range of t-shirts and hoodies is available at Unibooks or University of South Australia Student Association (USASA) counters across all metropolitan campuses. They are also available from Whyalla Campus Operations Unit and Mt Gambier Campus Reception area or online.

And as work on the Jeffery Smart Building on the City West campus comes close to completion, the campus has brightened up its George Street walkway with a student mural (featured in last month's UniSA News).

The University has also launched a Global Engagement Framework and new offshore campus collaborations, as well as the evolution of the University's regional engagement strategy.

Professor Larry Lockshin, Pro Vice Chancellor of Strategic Coordination, says in the next few months there will be further announcements on the Reconciliation Action Plan, Smoke Free Campus and capital plan.

# Students sign up for one-way ticket to Mars

While UniSA students have their sights set on goals all over the globe, three students have gone a step further and are looking to become some of the first people to live on Mars.

They might just accomplish their dreams, having made the cut from 200,000 applicants to a shortlist of just over 1000 for the Mars One project.

There's a catch, however, as the ticket to Mars is oneway only. But Mechanical Engineering student Tristan Perkins (pictured right) says he would be happy to live out the rest of his life on the red planet in the spirit of discovery.

"I applied to be part of the Mars One project because everyone on earth from Archimedes to Einstein was born, lived out their lives and died on Earth; I want to break new ground," Tristan says.

"I think that a future where we are a space-faring civilisation is a much more exciting and inspiring future than one where we are not."



The Mars One project, the brainchild of Dutch entrepreneur Bas Lansdorp and space researcher Arno Wielders, aims to establish a permanent human settlement on Mars. Crews of four will depart every two years, starting in 2024.

Tristan says he has always been interested in space exploration, and chose to study mechanical engineering to help him in his future career.

"When I started studying mechanical engineering my goal was always to study postgraduate aerospace engineering, and hopefully either work for a rocket or a satellite firm, or become a pilot in the military," he says.

"From the mechanisms in a clock or a car to how the universe started, I enjoy exploring how and why things work, which is a passion I could easily transfer to the mission. There will also be lots of construction and things needing to be maintained or repaired, so being mechanically minded would be helpful."

The next step in the application process involves examinations by a general practitioner, a psychologist and an optometrist, before an interview with the Mars One selection panel. Eventually the current field of 1058 will be reduced to 40, who will undergo rigorous training and simulation testing.

"I am passionate about science and technology, and whether I make it through to the final group of astronauts or not, I hope this gets people interested in talking about science and technology because there's a huge gap in the conversation," Tristan says.

Josh Richards, who was a student at the Southern Hemisphere Summer Space Program (SHSSP) run annually by UniSA in partnership with the International Space University (ISU), first heard of the Mars One project when he was researching a comedy show about the frustration he felt that humans hadn't left low earth orbit since 1972 and how we can only send people one-way to Mars.

Josh, a stand-up comedian and science communicator, says within minutes of researching the show he found that Mars One had made its first major press-release just three days before.

"I knew from my physics degree that the real financial and technical challenges of exploring Mars were the return trip," Josh says.

"Rather than write a comedy show about how we should be colonising Mars and being frustrated that we haven't, I started writing a show about how we were going to colonise Mars, which I ended up touring around the country and performing at the Mars One Living on Mars Convention in the Netherlands last November.

"In April 2012 when applications opened I put my money where my mouth is and applied!

"I studied with UniSA/ISU as it was an amazing opportunity to learn about how the space industry works, meet some of the key players (and a few astronauts!), and see how I could use my skills and strengths to contribute to the exploration of space.

"The Mars One project presents an incredible opportunity for everyday people who would otherwise be prevented from becoming astronauts (primarily by national politics) to participate in the expansion of our species beyond low Earth orbit."

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

Bolden shared his inspiring story with a captivated audience, urging the young students to reach for the stars.

Speaking of his own experience as an African American growing up in a segregated society, Maj Gen Bolden told the students to let nothing hold them back from chasing their dreams.

"Don't let the colour of your skin, your gender, where you're from or what part of town you live in, limit what you can achieve in life," he said.

In addition to the honorary doctorates awarded at graduations, retired Pro Vice Chancellor of the Business School, Professor Gerry Griffin was also awarded an Emeritus Professorship.

More than 5000 students graduated from the University during the week. Among them was Trevor Ritchie, who crossed the stage to become the first Indigenous occupational therapist in South Australia.

UniSA Vice Chancellor Professor David Lloyd said graduations are a time to celebrate the next generation of professionals entering the workforce, and at the same time reflect on those who have already made a huge contribution to the community.

"This is when we celebrate not only students' hard work and success but also the potential of what comes next in their careers," Prof Lloyd said.

"Our students are graduating from university with a drive to have a real impact on the world, to make their mark in their chosen field and at the same time to work towards a better society.

"In conferring special awards we are recognising the inspiring example of outstanding individuals who have already contributed so much to the community throughout their remarkable careers.





"Charles Bolden forged a highly successful international space career in an era where barriers for African Americans were almost insurmountable.

"Here in Australia, Anne Summers was a leader of the generation and the movement that changed Australia for women and contributed to increasing women's participation in higher education.

"And the Wolf Blass story is an exemplar of the spirit of enterprise. From his modest beginnings, Wolf went on to build one of Australia's most awarded and successful wineries and wine brands."

Prof Lloyd said this year's graduation ceremonies were also a chance to honour the fundamental role Prof Høj and Prof Griffin have each played in the evolution of UniSA.

"Peter made an indelible mark on the University during his five-year tenure as Vice Chancellor and President," Prof Lloyd said.

"Under his leadership, UniSA became one of Australia's most rapidly developing universities. For two consecutive years (2010-11), UniSA was the most improved Australian university in the QS World University Rankings – only five universities improved their position since 2009, and UniSA's ranking moved from 19 to 11 in Australia.

"Gerry also played an important part in UniSA's history – he was instrumental in winning EQUIS accreditation for the Business School which was re-accredited in 2007, 2010 and again this year for another three years.

"In addition, he conceived, planned and initiated a new Law School which awarded its first graduates in March 2011."

## Two Fulbrights for UniSA

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Two UniSA PhD students are among 31 from across Australia who have been awarded a prestigious Fulbright Scholarship that will see them travel to America for up to 10 months to further their research.

Sadie Heckenberg (pictured right) from the David Unaipon College of Indigenous Education and Research, won the Fulbright Indigenous scholarship which will see her study at the University of Hawaii Manoa, Honolulu, at the Centre for Oral History.

Sadie's research aims to address the need to protect Indigenous spoken cultural language.

She says by developing her knowledge of Indigenous epistemologies of the Pacific, she will in turn build the depth and strength of research to take back to her home community, the Wiradjuri community in New South Wales.



"I am truly excited to be able to study with some of the best minds in the Indigenous oral history field," Sadie says.

"The Hawaiian knowledge systems have been nurtured and maintained by wise Eldership reflected not only through the achievements of Hawaiian academic research but in society itself."

Suzanne Schultz (pictured right) from the School of Pharmacy and Medical Sciences won the Fulbright SA State Category Postgraduate scholarship which will see her study at the Harvard Kennedy School of Government in Massachusetts.

Suzanne's research focuses on international and inter-sector collaboration in drug development. In particular, her research in the US will consider the impact and effectiveness of proposed models for identifying, developing and commercialising new, or reviving existing, antibiotics.

She says that as the largest clinical market for pharmaceutical drugs and a key regulatory environment, the US offers unparalled expertise and network opportunities.

"Contrasting and comparing the business models and ideas in facilitating antibiotic development with approaches in Europe and Australia will open new opportunities to work differently," Suzanne says.



The Fulbright program is the largest and one of the most prestigious educational scholarship programs in the world. It operates between the United States and more than 155 countries worldwide.

It was established in Australia in 1949 through a binational treaty between the Australian and US Governments. It has supported almost 4800 scholarships.

# UniSA leads new \$88 million CRC in big data

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UniSA is now the national headquarters of another Cooperative Research Centre (CRC) – the \$88 million Data to Decisions CRC which is set to boost national security.

Announced in February, the Data to Decisions CRC is expected to help build a substantial big data industry, which will position Australia as an international exemplar in the development and use of big data capability across many sectors.

The new CRC places UniSA at the forefront of industry and academic research collaboration, with the University now leading three CRCs and partnering in 10 more.

The Data to Decisions CRC will be led by Dr Sanjay Mazumdar who heads up the Defence and Systems Innovation Centre, a joint venture between UniSA and the University of Adelaide.

Dr Mazumdar says the overarching research challenge being addressed by the CRC is 'how does the defence and national security sector efficiently extract intelligence and unforseen insights from big data within a balanced privacy paradigm?'.

"Every day, society creates 2.5 quintillion bytes of data from disparate sources including satellite imagery, social media content, digital pictures, videos and voice recordings," Dr Mazumdar says.

"This data is referred to as big data and it cannot be efficiently analysed using traditional data processing applications.

"The National Security Strategy for Australia highlights the importance of timely and accurate intelligence as a powerful weapon against security threats.

"Addressing big data challenges and applying high-performance analytics can make the difference between predicting a threat and reacting to a catastrophic aftermath."

The new CRC has been funded for five years by a \$25 million CRC grant and \$62.5 million participant

contributions. It will involve researchers in areas of computer science, engineering, business and law from UniSA, the University of Adelaide, the University of New South Wales, Deakin University and Carnegie Mellon University, with industry input from IT and systems integration companies, consulting companies and small-to-medium enterprises in collaboration with state and federal national security agencies.

## **Internships in Japan**

Time spent on a new internship program in Japan is proving to be very worthwhile for UniSA students.

Already two students have completed a six-month credit-bearing internship at Japan Display Inc (JDI), a company that is a major supplier of business and employee services to leading Japanese companies, while another two students are currently in Japan. This opportunity is supported by FujiWork which is in partnership with JDI.

For Master of Human Factors and Safety Management Systems student Jaimie Dolling, the six months in Japan is an opportunity that she would highly recommend, as would her fellow intern Stephanie Crook.

"I loved having the opportunity to travel to another country and to be exposed to their culture, to live there and be completely immersed in it," Jaimie said.

"I loved the work and being able to experience working in a foreign country and gain an understanding of how work is conducted in Japan.

There were also opportunities to work in areas that I had not worked in before which was very exciting, and has given me the chance to round out my skills. "The work ethic and working culture in Japan is a lot stronger than I have experienced in Australia. People work five to seven days a week and it is normal to be working overtime and not to leave until your boss leaves.

"I would recommend that if anyone has the opportunity to go, they take it. It will give you a completely different perspective on the world, work, relationships and culture."

Ella Ward (pictured far right), a Bachelor of Management (Marketing) and Bachelor of International Relations student who is currently in Japan, agrees that grabbing hold of opportunities like this internship is highly recommended.

"If you study and have a desire to travel, the two can work together," Ella said. "I'm not sure if students are fully aware just how supportive the University can be when it comes to study-related travel.

"A lot of people assume you can only do an exchange if you study another language but that's not the case. There are all types of international programs available, not only for study but for internships such as this one and also for short-term programs for aid work, etc. There are so many programs on offer that people can look into – it's really a great quality of UniSA."

Before starting the JDI internship, Ella had spent five months in Japan on an exchange program with funding from the University.

"The internship appealed to me because it meant I could extend my stay in Japan with hopes to see a different side of the country," Ella said.

"I was also eager to get my foot in the door of a renowned international business and a high priority for me was continuing to improve my Japanese language skills

"So far the internship has been really interesting. I think the internship is ideal for engineering students, or perhaps those studying inter-business management, finance or human resources and those with an interest in production. The internship is based at a manufacturing plant so for engineering students, it's truly unsurpassable."

Joining Ella in Japan is Jack Baker, a Bachelor of Mechanical and Mechatronic Engineering student who is basing his final year project on the work he is doing at JDI.

The JDI internship program is supported by funding from the Australian Government's New Colombo Plan which offers Australian undergraduates new opportunities for prestigious scholarships and grants for study and internships in the Indo-Pacific region.

The program was developed because of ITEE community engagement with the City of Salisbury which has a sister city agreement with Mobara City where JDI is based.

Manager of the UniSA program, Gail Jackman from the Division of Information Technology, Engineering and the Environment, said the internship projects are designed around the student's academic discipline to ensure maximum outcomes from this international experience.

"The internships will be in divisions of the company and in the context of activities directly relevant to the students' majors," Jackman said.

"The student interns are exposed to state-of-the-art manufacturing and technology including robotics, innovation, world-class business practices and marketing techniques, taking into account sustainability and the environment, and working in good and safe conditions.

"The interns are spending spend 3.5 days per week in the JDI working environment. The other 3.5 days per week the students have activities organised for them to immerse themselves in wider Japanese life and deepen their understanding of Japanese language, culture and traditions."

The program is ongoing and may expand to more students for each intake.

# Wanted: 150 mentors to help high school Back to story index students reach for the stars

The program which brought billionaire entrepreneur Sir Richard Branson to the University last year and is raising Indigenous student high school completion rates across the country is back at UniSA for a second year.

The Australian Indigenous Mentoring Experience (AIME) – a nation-wide educational program that gives Indigenous high school students the skills, opportunities and confidence to finish school at the same rate as their non-Indigenous peers – is ramping up its operations at UniSA with a goal to recruit 150 new university mentors this year.

The mentors will work with 300 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander high school students in Adelaide's northern and western suburbs, conducting sessions on everything from résumé-writing to hip hop.

One of the students who was part of AIME's inaugural year at UniSA is Fern Seacombe (pictured bottom right). A public relations and world politics student, Fern says she joined the mentoring program with hopes of helping teenagers reach their full potential, but what she got out of the program was far greater than that.

"I wanted to encourage the children to reach for the stars as I am a huge believer that children can create their own future no matter what – they just need someone to say 'hey, you can do this, I believe in you'," she says.

"The best part of AIME for me was seeing how the children changed over the year. They started off shy but after a few sessions they started talking about their dreams and ambitions. Some of them shared their stories with me – life seemed so tough for some of them and yet every time I saw them they were smiling and singing.

"They were so much fun to be around but most importantly, they showed me so much about strength and resilience. It was a very humbling experience. They taught me a lot about life and helped me with my own journey."

Fern's own path to university hasn't been smooth but she hopes her experiences will help the mentees relate to her and see what is possible with the right attitude.

Diagnosed with ADHD, dyslexia and dysgraphia as a child, Fern says education has been a challenge for her.

"To say school was hard for me would be an understatement. However my story is not unique and there are many children having the same struggles as I did or even going through worse," she says.

"What has helped me succeed at university is finding motivation through teaching children at a local swimming centre. I have worked with some amazing children, many of whom were facing hard challenges.

"I soon learnt that while not every story is the same, and some could be worse than others, the truth is everyone is facing challenges and everyone is trying to overcome them.

"This became my motivation to do well to conquer my challenges and set an example for all the children I work with. I was surprised to see how much achieving my goals would motivate children to overcome their own challenges."

UniSA's Adjunct Associate Professor Rosie Le Cornu, who has worked in the field of education for more than two decades, says mentoring can have huge benefits for mentors as well as the mentees. She says the mentee is provided with support, while the mentor is provided with opportunities for reflection on practice and is affirmed for their experience and expertise.

"It works best when we move away from a conventional mentoring model – with its traditional hierarchical relationships – to a co-mentoring model," says Assoc Prof Le Cornu.

"Here both mentor and mentee are positioned as learners and a reciprocal relationship can develop where both the mentee and mentor can learn from each other.

"I think university students participating in the AIME program have a lot to gain from the experience. It's an opportunity to reflect on themselves and on their values and attitudes and to learn more about themselves in the process."

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## Arts success for UniSA graduates at Helpmann

Adelaide was a-buzz with the arts throughout Mad March, and UniSA graduates enjoyed their share of the limelight with many exhibiting their art at events across the city and beyond.

Fourteen of the 33 graduates displaying their talent at the recent Helpmann Academy Graduate Exhibition were from UniSA's School of Art, Architecture and Design, with six winning awards.

Zoe Kirkwood (pictured right), who studied a Bachelor of Visual Arts (Honours), won two awards for her largescale installation The Neo-Baroque Spectacle.

Zoe won the Hill Smith Gallery/Helpmann Academy Friends Award, valued at \$5000, which provides for travel to any destination in the world and cash towards living expenses, as well as the \$3000 City of Adelaide Award, supported by the Adelaide City Council, giving her the opportunity to exhibit her work at Art Pod, an Adelaide City Council exhibition space which launched in 2013.

"It was incredibly amazing. The Neo-Baroque Spectacle has been an all-consuming year-long project and it is really fantastic to have it received in such a positive way," Zoe said.

"The work is based on ideas of contemporary excess and uses the baroque as a framework to explore these. The installation draws, in particular, on the notion of the bel composto from the 17th century baroque spectacle in which painting, sculpture and architecture were unified.

"I have just been accepted into the national graduate show Hatched in Perth at the Perth Institute of Contemporary Arts and will be installing my work there in May for the show. I also have an exhibition in the Project Space at the Contemporary Art Centre of South Australia in late April which I am really excited about and am busy

making work for.

"As for the travel prize money, it's been such a crazy few weeks I have yet to really think about where I'd like to go! One option I would love to look into would be to do a residency along with it."

Fellow UniSA graduate Tom Borgas will also be offered an exhibition at Art Pod after receiving a high commendation by Adelaide City Council.

The Council also presented Honours graduate and ceramic artist Sophia Nuske with a \$2000 acquisitive award. Her series of delicate hand-built stoneware pencils (pictured below right) will become part of the council's collection of artworks exhibited across the city.

The SALA Festival Award was presented to joint winners, both of whom are UniSA graduates. Emily Clinton and Jessica Hansen won \$500 each as well as a Premium Registration for the SALA Festival 2014.

## Architecture students' vision for hospital Back to story index site remodel

A UniSA graduate, student prize winner and tutor will travel to Europe later this year to further explore his idea of adapting the Royal Adelaide Hospital (RAH) site into a new performing arts school and concert facility.

Jet O'Rourke (pictured right) won the 2013 Architectural Travelling Prize in Architecture from the Architectural Practice Board of South Australia (APBSA), valued at \$5000, to go towards developing his research into adaptive use of modernist buildings like those on the existing RAH site.

Fellow graduate Tom Hocking (pictured below) was also successful in the RAH International Design Competition, being one of two winners in the Student Design Competition. His entry sought to create greater possibilities for social interaction within the public realm of Adelaide through a master plan of the RAH site underlined by the belief that the fuller the city, the better.

For Jet, he says travelling to Germany, London and Paris - places with a lot more experience at dealing with preservation of heritage buildings - will help him build on the research undertaken last year during his Master of Architecture.

"I'd like to use the RAH as a case study of how Adelaide architects could approach the preservation and adaption of our modern heritage," Jet says.

"Although it is questionable to consider the modernist buildings on the RAH site as outstanding examples of their time, what has been ignored is what they represent in the history of healthcare in the 20th century.

"So while the basis of my research is about how we can transform the RAH site, the travelling prize will give the APBSA a body of work that reflects our response in the industry to issues of conservation and adaptive reuse of modernist buildings in our local context that could be the

basis of a new architectural strategies."

Jet's idea for converting the East Wing situated on the RAH into a new performing arts school and concert facility came after he posed the question, 'what does Adelaide need?'. And as a former musician who has toured the US and Canada, music was at the forefront of his mind.

"What is almost certain is that Adelaide requires an additional secondary school, and that in terms of cultural landmarks, Adelaide's music venues are either too big or too small," Jet says.

"With this in mind, a strategy was devised to pair a performing arts secondary school with a new music facility for Adelaide - the East End Concert Hall - for small to medium performances and events."

Jet's vision for an outdoor amphitheatre between the concert hall and neighbouring Bice Building to promote unique urban spaces.

Jet will travel to Europe in the second half of this year. In the meantime he is undertaking his first commission - an alteration in Aldgate - as well as tutoring at UniSA while he takes advantage of opportunities for professional development in architectural practices in Adelaide and beyond.

This is the fourth time in four years that a UniSA student has won the Architectural Travelling Prize in Architecture from APBSA.

"The fact that this is the fourth consecutive time it has been awarded to a UniSA graduate speaks for the high quality of our graduates, the program and the teaching staff including those practitioners who contribute to the teaching program," says UniSA Architecture Program Director Stephen Ward.

For Tom, winning the student prize in the RAH competition has given him a sense of validation.

"In the final year of a design course, you become really internalised as the process is totally consuming," Tom says.

"To enter this work into a competition opens up this process and offers a considered interpretation of your work by others. To then go on to win gives you a sense a validation that all those late nights and stressful dreams, along with the thought and energy put into the project, has been understood and appreciated by someone else."

Tom has been working with architecture firm Hames Sharley full-time since finishing his degree after part-time work there during university.


#### The Australian Mother Teresa of Southern India

The late Sister Mary Theodore may not be well known in her home country of Australia but she is considered the Mother Teresa of Southern India by many people in India who witnessed her work with children with disabilities.

Sister Mary Theodore's inspirational work is the basis of a newly released book, *God's Donkey, Sister Mary Theodore and the story of Mithra*, written by Associate Professor Peter Gale, Senior Lecturer at UniSA's David Unaipon College of Indigenous Education and Research.

Sister Mary Theodore started one of the first homes for children – Mithra – in India in 1977 and was also a founding leader of the Special Olympics in India.

"Sister Mary Theodore was an inspiration to many and I was inspired by her vision and her passion from the first time we met in 1983 and I was so privileged to have been able to become a close friend over the next 30 years," Assoc Prof Gale says.



"It has been such a joy to have also been able to write a book on such a humble and gracious Australian who has achieved so much through her dedication, love and faith. I hope that many more will be inspired through her story.

"The life of Sister Mary Theodore and the stories throughout this book highlight the special relationship that has developed between India and Australia through her life and her 61 years in India, and through her care of challenged children in Chennai.

"This is a story of connections between Australia and India, and in particular, that of the many thousands of visitors, volunteers and supporters in Australia. Many Australians were inspired by Sister Mary Theodore and came as volunteers or visitors at the Mithra home for children.

"Many young Australians came to stay a week, and stayed for years. Many came and experienced something special, returning again, and again. Many, like myself, have visited Mithra over the years and were profoundly influenced by their experience and in their relationships with Sister Mary Theodore.

"Sister Mary Theodore's vision of hope and independence for children with disabilities will live on as will her legacy through Mithra as it continues to grow and develop Sister Mary Theodore's vision."



Sister Mary Theodore helped to set up Mithra, an institution that educates and rehabilitates children with

mental and physical disabilities from the poorest families, during her early years as part of the Franciscan Missionaries of Mary when she was in her early 20s. She eventually left the Franciscan Missionaries of Mary so that she could continue her work with Mithra.

As the head of a non-government organisation, Australind Children's Fund, Assoc Prof Gale has helped to raise over \$1m in funding for Mithra over the past 15 years. In this role, he visited Sister Mary Theodore every year since 1998.

A few years prior to her death in 2012, Assoc Prof Gale had spoken to her about writing a book about Mithra and her life in India. He says that audio recordings taken before she passed away form a very special part of the book.

#### Skills for Academic and Career Success

Three other UniSA academics also contributed to the book – Associate Professor Stephen Boyle, Sarah Hattam and Jennifer Stokes.





It is described as an institution that links people with technology by sustaining livelihoods on country.

#### Cookies
